Catholic Church just because you have been confirmed." He urged them to continue an earnest study of their religion and the history of the Church.

"This church is being opened," said Bishop O'Brien, "through the charity of a good woman who wanted to have the

right kind of memorial for the dead."

He was referring to Mrs. Edward Ennis of Chicago, who donated \$6,000 toward the purchase and completion of the Henning church in honor of her late husband. Mrs. Ennis, accompanied by her sonin-law, was present for dedication ceremonies and had a special place of honor in the church.

A brass tablet placed over the inside entrance of St. Edward's church reads: "Pray for the soul of Edward Ennis in whose memory a generous donation was made to this church through the Catholic Church Extension Society of the

United States of America in 1950."

"You will be surprised how much your parish will grow," Bishop O'Brien said to the parishioners. "I hope that

many of you will see the day when you will have your own Catholic school."

Bishop O'Brien regretted the fact that "many millions of dollars are wasted annually by our Christian people for monuments and mausoleums that do no good for the dead and only cater to the pride of the living."
"This church," he emphasized, "is a living memorial, one that will bring many spiritual benefits to

both the living and the dead."

Accompanying Bishop O'Brien to Henning from Chicago was Monsignor R.R. St. John, also of the Extension

The Chicago Auxiliary Bishop administered the sacrament of Confirmation for the first time in the history of

Henning. In the calss were 31 childrena nd six adults.

Bishop Bartholome Speaks

Bishop Bartholome, who was also in the sanctuary during the Solemn Mass, spoke briefly at the close of the ceremonies.

"This is indeed a happy occasion for the Bishops, priests, and people of the Diocese of St. Cloud to have a new parish started and a new church erected for the Kingdom of Christ."

He expressed thanks to Bishop O'Brien for coming to Henning and also for the important work he is doing as

president of the Extension society.

Bishop Bartholome thanked Mrs. Ennis for her important part in this start of the Henning church: "We extend our most heartfelt thanks and appreciation to them and assure them of our remembrances of them in the future

He referred to Monsignor August Plachta of Wadena, who was in charge of the beginnings of the Henning parish in 1945, and to the several assistants to Monsignor Plachta, who ministered to the Henning Catholics, and to

Father Brandl, pastor of the Henning parish since July, 1948.

To the Henning parishioners he said: "I trust that God's blessing will come upon yo in the years to come."

Monsignor Plachta was celebrant of the Solemn Mass, assisted by Father Robert Voigt as deacon, Father Walter Bednark, sub-deacon; and Father Allen Speiser, master of ceremonies. Both Father Voigt and Father Bednark, when they were assistants in Wadena, offered Mass for the Henning Catholics in a funeral parlor here every Sunday. Father James Mohm, Osakis, led the chanting for the dedication ceremonies.

A group of girls from St. Ann's parish, Wadena, under the direction of Sister Ubalda, sang for the Mass. Altar

boys from Wadena served.

Women of the Henning parish served a cafeteria dinner in the public high school to all visiting clergy, other

guests, and parishioners at noon.



Dedication At Henning Held Sunday
